

Key Knowledge

- England is ruled by a Queen
- The Queen was born a long time ago
- William I came from France. He killed King Harold in 1066 and took over England, becoming known as 'William the Conqueror'
- King Henry VIII was desperate for a son
- When his wife Katherine of Aragon gave birth to a baby girl, he divorced her
- He split England from the Catholic Church and created the Church of England
- Henry had a total of six wives. He divorced two and beheaded two!
- Richard III is often remembered for being a cruel and unkind king
- Some people think he killed his nephews to become king
- He is also famous because nobody knew where he was buried until his skeleton was discovered in a car park in 2012
- Elizabeth I was the daughter of Henry VIII.
- She never married, although she said she was married to her country



Queen Victoria

Key Vocabulary

Capital city - A country's main city where government leaders work in government buildings.

Chronological - Events in chronological order follow the order in which they happened. Coronation - The ceremony of crowning a monarch.


Government - A group of people that rule a country and make laws, collect taxes and print money.

Queen - A queen is a female ruler of an independent state. A queen usually inherits her position by being born into a royal family.

King - A king is a male ruler of an independent state. A king usually inherits his position by being born into a royal family.

Monarch - someone of great power. We sometimes refer to them as a sovereign which means 'supreme ruler'. A monarch is a head of state, usually they have the title of king, queen, or emperor

Reign - (noun) the period of rule of a monarch.


